MONTANNA CAMPBELL
WA POLICE ABORIGINAL
CADET PROGRAM

Montanna is a young Noongar, Walmajarri and Gooniyandi woman from Katanning, and a MADALAH Alumna from Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School. In year 12, she had the tough job of planning out what she was going to do in her career after school but had plenty of options having completed certificates in Sport and Rec, PE Teaching and Ed Support.



With all options considered, there were still some things on her mind that could not be ignored, including her passion for equality, community safety, helping the fight against drugs and alcohol, assisting her community and stamping out racism. All of these led to a dream of Montanna's which was to join the WA Police. Montanna was later offered a Cadetship with the West Australian Police Force commencing this year.

### **NAIDOC ART EXHIBITION**

#### CHRIST CHURCH GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Christ Church Grammar School held their annual NAIDOC art exhibition which gave their Indigenous students the opportunity to showcase their artwork to school staff, students, special guests, families, and the girls from St Hilda's Anglican School.

The artwork was a collaboration with BlankWalls and CCGS old boy Irwin Lewis. The amazing artwork is four separate pieces, each representing different waterways and country. The themes represented are saltwater, freshwater, waterholes, and land. These four pieces of art each had their own colour scheme, but the art all blended in together to create one large piece.

On each piece themes of bush tucker, hunting and different traditional food sources were also included, along with each Indigenous student choosing and painting an animal that they related to the most. The artwork was revealed on the night and placed at the CCGS canteen, a spot where many staff and students will visit.

Each student was gifted an appreciation present; a custom-designed shirt with their individual artwork on it which the boys really admired.

The next morning CCGS held their NAIDOC assembly with Noongar Elder Uncle Barry Winmar providing a beautiful Welcome to Country. This was followed by a range of school performances, presentations and the CCGS Indigenous students preforming traditional dances with the guidance and support of Uncle Barry Winmar again and Noongar man Dylan Stack who helped paint the boys and also played the Didgeridoo during the performance.

It was a fantastic NAIDOC celebration, and we couldn't be prouder of the CCGS boys!





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
